The County of Los Angeles Department of Public Works once again successfully hosted 5 Earth Day events in a two month period. These enriching events allowed students, community groups and civic leaders to work together to plant native trees and shrubs and, in some cases, dedicate art to serve as a monumental reminder for surrounding residents to preserve the beautified greenery and to protect the local watersheds.

Each Earth Day event was filled with educational elements to help students understand how their everyday activities can affect our environment. The Board of Supervisors, local civic leaders and community organizations helped contribute to the success of each Earth Day.

Sources cited at the time of the Enzo crash indicated that former Swedish video game executive Bo Stefan Eriksson, 45, since adjudicated to be the driver of the totalled super-car and sentenced to three years jail time for grand theft charges related to the crash, supposedly brought video monitoring skills to the organization.

A major unanswered piece of the crash scene puzzle concerns the identity of the individuals who apparently facilitated Eriksson's departure from the accident scene without his being arrested, or even booked, as it appears that the SGVTA's five board members were issued police badges.

Among the issues that may come to light in next month's trial are the bureaucratic procedures used for creating quasi-law enforcement agencies such as this paratransit agency.

The possibility that a small shuttle service could seek government status and funding, even if it was run out of an auto repair shop and had its after-hours tele-

phone calls answered by an out-of-state answering service, can also shed light on the workings of so-called homeland security legislation and a myriad of civil rights and other civil liberties issues in what appears to be a climate of growing paranoia.

How the transit agency became linked to the crash of the rare Enzo and the role of its representatives at the accident scene where Eriksson was reportedly described as "a deputy commissioner with the agency's anti-terrorism unit" is also expected to be addressed.

Moments after the crash

occurred, two unidentified men showed up at the Pacific Coast Highway accident scene and flashed badges that were sufficiently "official" looking to convince the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department deputies at the scene that they were authentic law enforcement agents.

Assuming that the more obvious questions are answered at next month's trial, most Ferrari crash saga observers expect there will be another new series of questions of increased complexity that will start the inquiry cycle all over again.

Students grow into Earth Day

EL MONTE - More than 100 elementary students showed off their green thumbs Wednesday to help make the Earth a better place.

As part of the San Gabriel River Earth Day 2007, about 150 fourth- and fifth-graders from Twin Lakes Elementary School spent the morning planting over 350 California-native trees and plants along the river.

County Supervisor Gloria Molina dedicated the garden and recreation area - located along the San Gabriel River and behind the school - and said the program will help ensure students understand the importance of taking care of the environment.

"We want the kids to learn the value of protecting and respecting the limited resources we have," Molina said.

The garden and recreation area, often referred to as an "eco-classroom," has benches, a walking path and rows of assorted trees, including California sycamore and white sage.

Fourth-grader Casandra Chavarin was thankful that Molina made the garden possible.

"I think the garden is wonderful because it makes the school prettier," Chavarin said. "And I'm really happy we have it."

Angelica Sifuentes-Donoso, the school's principal, explained to students trees are needed for oxygen and urged them to continue recycling and conserving water.

"This is our way to help in a minute way and preserve our environment," Sifuentes-Donoso said.

Molina said the garden will be maintained by the Department of Public Works, but encouraged the kids to help by not participating in graffiti and by picking up any trash they see in the garden.

Student Darlene Palomares said she thinks the garden is a nice addition to her school.

"To me this place shows we care for our school and the Earth and that we want a nice community," Palomares, 10, said.

Sifuentes-Donoso said Twin Lakes is committed to teaching students about the environment and said the school has had a recycling program and two learning gardens since 1994.
