Senate Bill 1383 (2016)

- SB 1383 establishes targets to achieve a 50 percent reduction in the level of statewide disposal of organic waste from the 2014 level by 2020 and a 75 percent reduction by 2025
- SB 1383 requires CalRecycle and ARB to adopt regulations to achieve the organic waste reduction goals
- The regulations must include requirements that not less than 20 percent of edible food that is currently disposed is recovered for human consumption by 2025






August Workshops – SB 1383 Regulations

- CalRecycle is hosting informal rulemaking workshops on Reporting Concepts and Compliance and Enforcement Concepts on August 16th, 2017 in Sacramento and August 31st, 2017 in Riverside
- Staff monitored the workshop on August 16th, 2017 and is planning to attend the workshop on August 31st, 2017
- After the next workshop, staff will prepare a comment letter to submit to CalRecycle before the commenting deadline of September 15th, 2017

Future Workshops

- CalRecycle will host additional workshops:
 - September 20th, 2017 Planning and Market Development
 - October 30th, 2017 Draft Regulatory Language
 - TBD (2017) Second Round Draft Regulatory Language
 - December 2017/January 2018 End of Informal Rulemaking
 - January/February 2018 Initiate Formal Rulemaking

Reporting Data Points

- Facilities MRFs/Transfer Stations, Landfills, Organic Waste Recycling Facilities
- Haulers
- Jurisdictions
- Select generators state agencies, federal facilities, schools (public schools, colleges, and universities)











- Edible food generators state agencies, federal facilities, and schools
- Large scale generators of edible food
- Edible food recovery organizations
- Haulers, if applicable

Compliance and Oversight Roles

- <u>CalRecycle</u> will directly oversee jurisdictions, LEAs, and any generators outside of jurisdictional authority, such as state agencies
 - Monitoring reporting and implementation of regulations
- Jurisdictions will directly oversee generators, haulers, and food recovery organizations
 - Monitor reporting and implementation of regulations
 - Monitor enforcement procedures
- <u>LEAs</u> will directly oversee solid waste facility owners/operators
 - Inspection and enforcement of state and solid waste laws and regulations

Potential Compliance & Enforcement Procedures



State

- Progressive Compliance notices to comply, potential penalties from OAL
- Inventory of Non-Compliant Facilities when entities are documented with repeated violations

• LEA

 Notices of violation, compliance schedule, cease and desist notices, notices and orders, issuance of penalties

Jurisdiction

Variety of tools within enforcement purview
