AB 1857 AB 2440/SB 1215 SB 54




- \$308 billion state budget was approved by the Governor on June 30th
- Most of the budget details are in AB 178 by Assemblymember Ting Budget
 Act of 2022 and AB 180 also by Assemblymember Ting Budget Act of 2021.
- \$180 million one-time Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund to advance organic waste infrastructure
- \$53.9 billion multi-year climate commitment

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Legislative Update AB 1857 – Solid Waste



- Would repeal the provision of law that allows jurisdictions to include up to 10% of the waste sent to transformation toward their 50% diversion requirement.
- Requires CalRecycle to administer the Zero-Waste Equity Grant Program
- Amended to remove the provisions that redefine "solid waste disposal"
- Task Force current position is <u>Oppose</u>
- Scheduled for hearing in the Senate Committee on Appropriations on August 1st

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AB 2440 & SB 1215 Battery EPR

- AB 2440 will remain a battery producer responsibility program for the collection, transportation, recycling, and the safe and proper management of batteries or batteryembedded products in the state.
- Task Force current position is <u>Support</u>



 Scheduled for hearing in the Senate Committee on Appropriations on August 1st

- SB 1215 would expand and modify the state's existing Electronic Waste Recycling Program to cover a larger suite of batteryembedded products.
 - Consumer to pay a covered electronic waste recycling fee starting in 2026.
- Task Force current position is <u>Support</u>
- Scheduled for hearing in the Assembly Committee on Appropriations on August 3rd

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SB 54 - Plastic Pollution Prevention and Packaging Producer Responsibility Act



- Signed into Law by the Governor on June 30th
- Proponents of a statewide measure withdrew it from the November ballot with just hours before the deadline,
- The new law requires specific materials to be recyclable or compostable,
- Requires producers of covered material to form and join a producer responsibility organization (PRO),
- Requires CalRecycle to prepare a statewide needs assessments,
- Creates the California Plastic Pollution Mitigation Fund, which will dedicate \$500 million per year for the next decade
 - CalRecycle is required to adopt regulations by January 1, 2025, and the EPR provisions of the new law are set to take effect Jan. 1, 2027.

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
